#### **AUKUS and the AMC: Summary of Key State and Federal Government Announcements**

Western Australia is set to be home to the biggest naval maintenance hub in the southern hemisphere. The level of investment will deliver continuous naval ship building and see the defence sector become the 'state's second largest industry.

The below table chronologically details the state and federal government announcements over the past 12 months in relation to Australia, The United Kingdom, and the United States (AUKUS) and the Australian Marine Complex (AMC) and also makes reference to several highly relevant United States and United Kingdom developments.
